We strive to support students where they are and develop healthy skills that will serve them in lifelong learning.

We are a community of supports that rely on the Circle of Courage philosophy. Our students realize personal success through the three A's: consistent attendance, positive attitudes, and the importance of achieving their academic potential.

SUPPORTIVE SPACES

Developing a strong sense of Belonging is critical to student success at McNaughton.

ACTIONS / STRATEGIES

- Honour Your Health: ISPARC (Indigenous Sport, Physical Activity, and Recreation Council) grants for healthy living.
- Youth Care Worker Support for all students
- Access to school counsellor, Nurse Practitioner, and Mental Health & Addictions counsellor on site weekly.
- Self-Regulation activities: yoga, swimming, school-wide walks, healthy eating options, cultural activities
- Collaboration with local Indigenous agencies, College of New Caledonia (dual credit) and Work BC to foster increased opportunity and school/community connection
- Start each day off with RAP class focused on relationship development and healthy physical and mental health strategies
- Small class sizes and teacher support
- Healthy breakfast, lunch and snacks provided to all students

MEASURES

- Student and parent voice surveys yearly
- Student learning survey each year
- Tracking (Attendance, Achievement, Attitude)
- Student self-assessment on Core Competencies

Literacy skills are central to all subjects and areas of learning




ACTIONS / STRATEGIES

- Small class sizes provide plenty of opportunity for one-on-one learning
- First Peoples English 12 & BC First Peoples 12
- Access to technology in all subject areas to assist with learning, understanding and communicating
- Safe and supported use of digital media
- Ongoing investment into our resource library based on teacher and student input
- Credit recovery in all subjects

Developing strong numeracy skills to be applied in all subject areas.

ACTIONS / STRATEGIES

- Students are given a large variety of numeracy assignment choices within all subjects to meet expectations of the curriculum
- Using numeracy skills in 'real life' applications
- Small class sizes provide plenty of opportunity for oneon-one learning, scaffolding on prior learning, reducing math anxiety
- Access to technology in all subject areas to assist with learning and understanding
- Use of board game activities and manipulatives to practice strategy, number sense, and logic concepts
- Credit recovery in all subjects
- Flexible, patient, personalized programming

- Review of transcripts with students/parents
- Student Learning updates/CBIEP/Student Support Plans
- Staff review of student progress in core subjects to identify areas of difficulty
